Service and Volunteerism

Helping other people gives you a warm feeling, deep down inside you. Here in the Pikes Peak region, many people volunteer to help others. Our military personnel have volunteered to protect our country with their lives. That is the ultimate service to others! The rest of us can volunteer to help others too, in smaller ways. Within our families, we can offer to help a younger brother or sister with their homework. We can offer to take out the trash. We can offer to wash the dishes (or empty the dishwasher).

Outside our families, we can help an elderly neighbor rake leaves, shovel snow, or repair something in their home. Older kids can offer to babysit one evening so young parents can go out on a date. When families go away on vacation, we can offer to take care of their pets, water their plants, or take in their newspaper... for free. We can welcome a new family to the neighborhood with homemade brownies. As we hike or bike along a trail, we can pick up trash (but be sure to follow any safety measures your parents dictate). Joining Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts is a great way to help others since the Scouts frequently do service projects. Older Scouts who hope to earn their Eagle Scout Award (Boy Scouts) or Gold Award (Girl Scouts) must plan and execute a detailed service project, so it's an ideal opportunity for younger Scouts to get involved too.

Does your family want to volunteer together? Take a look at the Community Agencies listed on ppld.org (click on Community Information, then Agencies, and Word Search). Search for "Volunteer Center of the Pikes Peak Region." It is connected to United Way and lists many agencies needing volunteers. Many allow teens volunteers, and quite a few allow families to volunteer together.



What interests you? Do you like to work with animals? You might contact the Humane Society of the Pikes Peak Region or one of the local animal rescue groups and see what you could do to help them out. Do you like children? Take a babysitting class, and then parents will be more comfortable having you watch their kids (from ppld.org, click on Community Information, Courses, Subject Search, Babysitting). Do you like to be outside? Help an elderly neighbor with yard work, or gardening. Do you like to organize activities? Organize a fun neighborhood carnival with games and prizes, and then donate any money you earn to your favorite charity. Do your Grandparents live far away? Visit a nursing home and "adopt" one of the residents as a special friend. Do you love the library? Kids ages 12 and up can volunteer for the Summer Reading Program, while kids ages 13 and up can be Study Buddies and/or Reading Buddies. (Applications will be available towards the end of March.)



Opportunities to volunteer your time and talents to help others are everywhere. Just look around. It can be lots of fun!

The catchy rhyme makes this a fun read aloud. The monsters in this story are happy eating rocks and tractors and such, but not broccoli. That is, until they eat broccoli, thinking they are eating trees. (Ages 3 - 7; picture book, health)

Hello Baby!

by Mem Fox
This is a great preschool book to read to the one that you love and treasure. We see a baby's hand at the beginning of the book, and the writer asks, "Who are you?" and we see lots of different animals - "Are you a monkey with clever toes? Perhaps you're a porcupine, twitching its nose." Share this with your favorite toddler/preschooler, and enjoy hearing them say, "No!" on each page, as they affirm their unique human status. (Ages 2 - 5; science, vocabulary)

Another great volunteer/service opportunity is listed on the **Community** page under **Projects** called **Reading Readiness Suggestions**. This will take you to **America Reads**, a program to insure literacy in children. Partnering with the Library makes you connected to many other opportunities to serve your community.

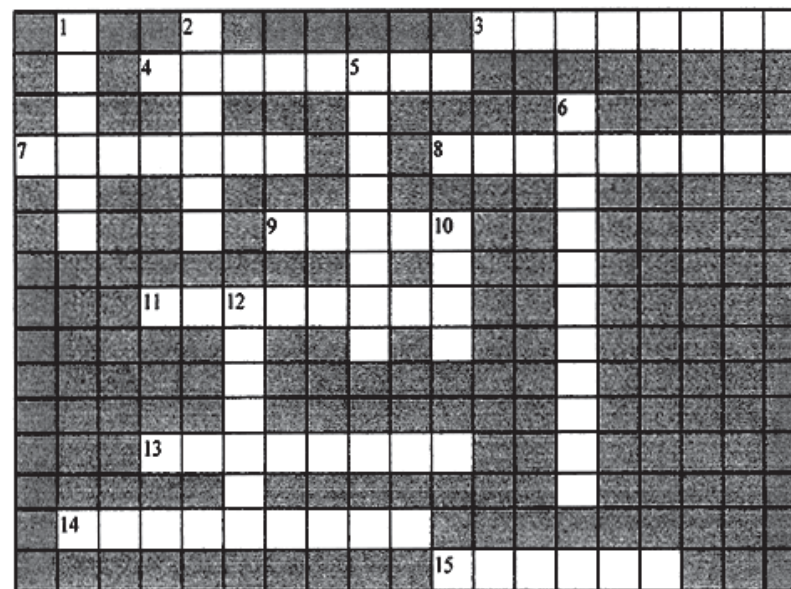
