
Margaret Atwood The Handmaid's Tale

World-renowned novelist Atwood presents a speculative fable of the near future. In the former U.S., far-right extremists win a civil war that establishes a theocracy that denies women jobs or money and assigns them to various classes: the chaste, childless Wives; the housekeeping Marthas; and the reproductive Handmaids, who turn their offspring over to the "morally fit" Wives.



Charlie Jane Anders All The Blrds In The Sky

The 2017 Nebula and Locus award-winner is about a witch and a techno-geek, their troubled relationship, and their attempts to save the world from destruction. This blend of literary fantasy and speculative fiction started a run of regular award nominations for Anders, including winning the 2020 Nebula for The City In The Middle Of Night.



Richard K. Morgan Altered Carbon series


This 2002 cyberpunk novel is set in a future in which interstellar travel and relative immortality is facilitated by transferring consciousnesses between bodies. It follows the attempt of a former elite soldier turned private investigator to investigate a rich man's death.



Nancy Kress After The Fall, Before The Fall And During The Fall

This elegant 2013 novella by an award-winning writer combines several wildly different ideas into a tight package. There's a bit of everything: time travel, hard science, environmental collapse, aliens, post-apocalyptic dystopia.





Anthony Burgess A Clockwork Orange

A vicious 15-year-old droog is the central character of this 1963 nightmare vision of the future. A Clockwork Orange is a frightening fable about good and evil, and the meaning of human freedom. And when the state undertakes to reform Alex to "redeem" him, the novel asks, "At what cost?"




N.K. Jemisin The Fifth Season
